DOING JUSTICE & SERVING OUR COMMUNITY

Helping Your Neighbors: Some churches in Elkhart are organizing English as a Second (ESL) classes for adults. Teachers are needed for the next session of classes, March 9-May 25, 2023 meeting at Prairie Street Mennonite Church. Sessions are on Tuesday and Thursday evenings 6:30-8:00pm. Volunteering once or twice a week is your choice. Materials are provided. You do not need to be a trained teacher. If desired, you may start as an assistant-in-training working with a veteran teacher. You do not need to be able to speak Spanish. Please contact Sueann

Goshen Resident ID card. In 2017, Center for Healing & Hope expanded its services to include immigrant advocacy programming. The first major initiative to take place during that time was the ability to offer what is known as the Goshen Resident ID, or "GRID" card. The card provides tangible benefits to navigating the challenges of settling in a new location. The card can be used to open a library account giving access to information, the internet, and other resources. It provides verified identification for the person carrying the card when that person interacts with community officials, such as law enforcement, city services, and schools. It can even be helpful when purchasing prescriptions or money handling transactions at approved locations. Local business supporters have also signed on to offer small "perks" when cardholders present their GRID card, creating a further sense of welcome. Chances are you have a driver's license at arm's reach. Perhaps you're thinking the GRID card isn't for you. You'd be accurate in the assumption that you don't need a GRID card. The greatest benefit of the GRID card may not actually be the benefit YOU receive, but the way it benefits others. When established local "allies" get a GRID card they do two important things - they pay \$25 to

Center for Healing & Hope to receive their card which supports the sustainability of the program, and they reduce stigmas attached to immigrants arriving in the community by showing solidarity with our neighbors. As such, we encourage anyone interested to register for their very own GRID card. Your GRID card could be the opening line in a story of hope for someone new to our community.
