## Stewardship of Money, Living Generously in a self-centered world August 18 - September 29

A larger congregational budget for 2019 made many of us gulp. The mortgage from the building expansion added a sizable chunk to our spending plan. Our budget is a snapshot of the congregation, a picture of who we are and what our priorities are, but most of us only look at it once a year. September is also national hunger month. Our local food pantry, The Window, is asking congregations to collect food.
